Many classic cars are celebrating big "0" birthdays in 2020

Mazda as a company recently observed its 100-year-old anniversary, it began in 1920 as Toyo Cork Kogo, a company that produced cork and machine tools. In 1927, Toyo Cork Kogo renamed itself Mazda and shifted toward the production of three-wheel pickup trucks and small vehicles.

Mazda's first passenger car, the R360 was introduced throughout Japan in 1960. The two-door, four-seat coupe went on to become a best-selling car in Japan until production ceased in 1966.

In 2020, <u>Pininfarina</u> will celebrate its 90th anniversary and to mark the occasion, the company has unveiled a new logo and detailed a series of events it will attend and host. Pininfarina, short for Carrozzeria Pininfarina, was founded by Battista 'Pinin' Farina in 1930 in Turin, Italy. In its formative years, the company built bodies for the likes of Ferrari, Austin, Alfa Romeo, Hispano-Suiza, Fiat, Cadillac, Rolls-Royce, Lancia, and others.

In 1970, **Land Rover** launched its revolutionary 4x4, midsize SUV, the Range Rover. The first fleet of vehicles, which turns 50, was initially produced by the Rover division of British Leyland and then the Rover Group. Only two-door models were produced until the four-door model was introduced in 1981.

Ford's Escort RS1600 known for its speed and "small but mighty" racing engine is also bringing in the big 5-0. The small European car was never sold in North America, but caught all the spotlight in Hollywood action-film series, "Fast and Furious".

Other classic cars such as Ferrari's **Mondial**, Bentley's **Mulsanne** and Audi's **Quattro** add to the list of automobiles celebrating anniversaries, turning 40. Rare sports cars including BMW's **8 Series E31** and Lamborghini's **Diablo** turn 30 this year.

End of grace period for mobile phone detection cameras

Mobile phone detection cameras in New South Wales came into operation in December 2019 around the state.

Unlike speed and red light cameras, the mobile phone detection cameras uses artificial intelligence (AI) to detect illegal phone use. It can operate in all weather conditions including fog and wet weather.

The AI technology will capture an image of the front seats and is then later reviewed by a human to verify an offence has been made.

A three month grace period was in place from December, whereby drivers would receive warning letters only. There were no fines or loss of demerit points during this time. However, from March 1, drivers caught by a mobile phone detection camera will be fined and lose demerit points.

The penalty for illegally operating a mobile phone while driving is \$344 or \$457, if detected in a school zone. You'll also lose five demerit points, this will double to ten during double demerit periods.

However, there will be allowances for <u>mobile phone use in the car</u>. These concessions include using a phone in a cradle with Bluetooth, handling a phone while passing it to a passenger, as well as using it in a drive-through service situation.

However, the Government will introduce the cameras without warning signs. The NSW government said it would "progressively expand" to perform 135 million vehicle checks by 2023. With independent modelling showing that these cameras could prevent around 100 fatal and serious injury crashes over five years.
